DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

Preparation for a career as theatre professional, encompassing topics in contemporary theatre, dance, performance theory and practice.

THR 492 Senior Seminar builds on concepts learned in THR 292 Sophomore Seminar. This course prepares you for a career as a theatre professional by developing your brand as a working artist, manager, or technician. This course prepares you to think about your artistic work-life balance as you plan to relocate and consider what jobs may be in your immediate and near future. This course offers alumni success stories who have produced work in the rapidly changing arts industries and created jobs that did not exist. This course asks you to think like an entrepreneur to achieve financial and artistic success throughout your career. This course challenges you to connect your art with the public in authentic and intentional ways to effect change or help others. Finally, this course fulfills your Tier II Writing requirement in the Department of Theatre as you compile a writing portfolio that uniquely addresses our shared discipline.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

In this course, you will expand, evolve, and examine your work as a theatre practitioner through preparation for your career and professional life and ways of enhancing the work you have done as a student of theatre at MSU.

Projects:

- Theatre Resume (+ 2 revisions)
- Business Resume (+ 1 revision)
- Relocation Plan (+ 1 revision)
- Cover Letter (+ 1 revision)
- Website (Minimum Requirement: Main Page/Home Page, Resume Page and Portfolio Page)
- Arts Entrepreneurship Project (AEP)
- Outreach and Engagement Project (OEP)

The OEP must be linked with the "community". The idea is that you take your "art" to the public. Examples of MSU's current outreach and engagement initiatives can be found at:

- Final submissions must include abstract and photos (one submission per group).

Writing Portfolio

The writing portfolio is a compilation of writing across multiple THR courses that uniquely addresses the discipline's type/style of writing. The portfolio will incorporate formal and informal writing assignments of varying lengths and include varying ways to approach revising/editing.

- Reflective/conceptual writing: Student writing as spectator OR as artist
- Self-evaluation/assessment writing: Student critically assessing their own artistic endeavor
- Comprehensive analytical writing: Student writing textual analysis of the play, or analysis of a particular historical era, or an analysis of a specific theatrical construct
- o Resumes, Cover letter writing: Student writing from a career-based perspective

ATTENDANCE

- Consistent attendance, whether online or in-person, is necessary (and mandatory). You will be allowed 2 unexcused absences without being penalized.
